Harvard College was a combination of an English public school and Emmanuel College. It was established because the colonists desired to perpetuate in their new home the essential features of their former life. It was, therefore, a kind of professional school to train leaders for the new colony, especially ministers for the Church. Requirements for admission in these earliest institutions were confined at first to Latin. When Greek was added, it included grammar and readings from the New Testament. Mathematics was not specified at first, but later comprised arithmetic and the rule of three. Pupils were prepared for college privately, in the grammar schools, or in the colleges themselves. Indeed, the colleges were at first half schools. Harvard was founded as the schoole and colledge at Newtown, Yale as a Collegiate Schoole, and Dartmouth grew out of Dr. Wheelock s school for the Indians.
